

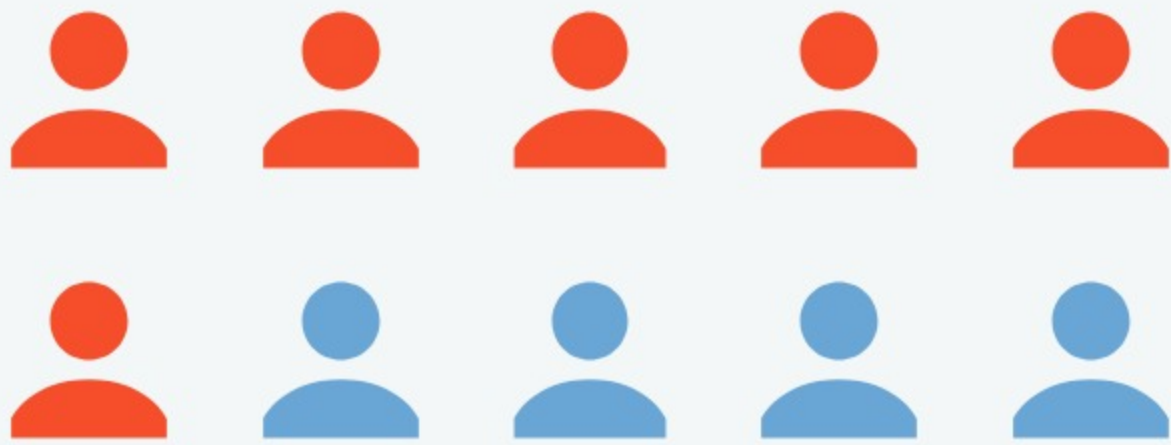


The National Institute for Latino School Leaders

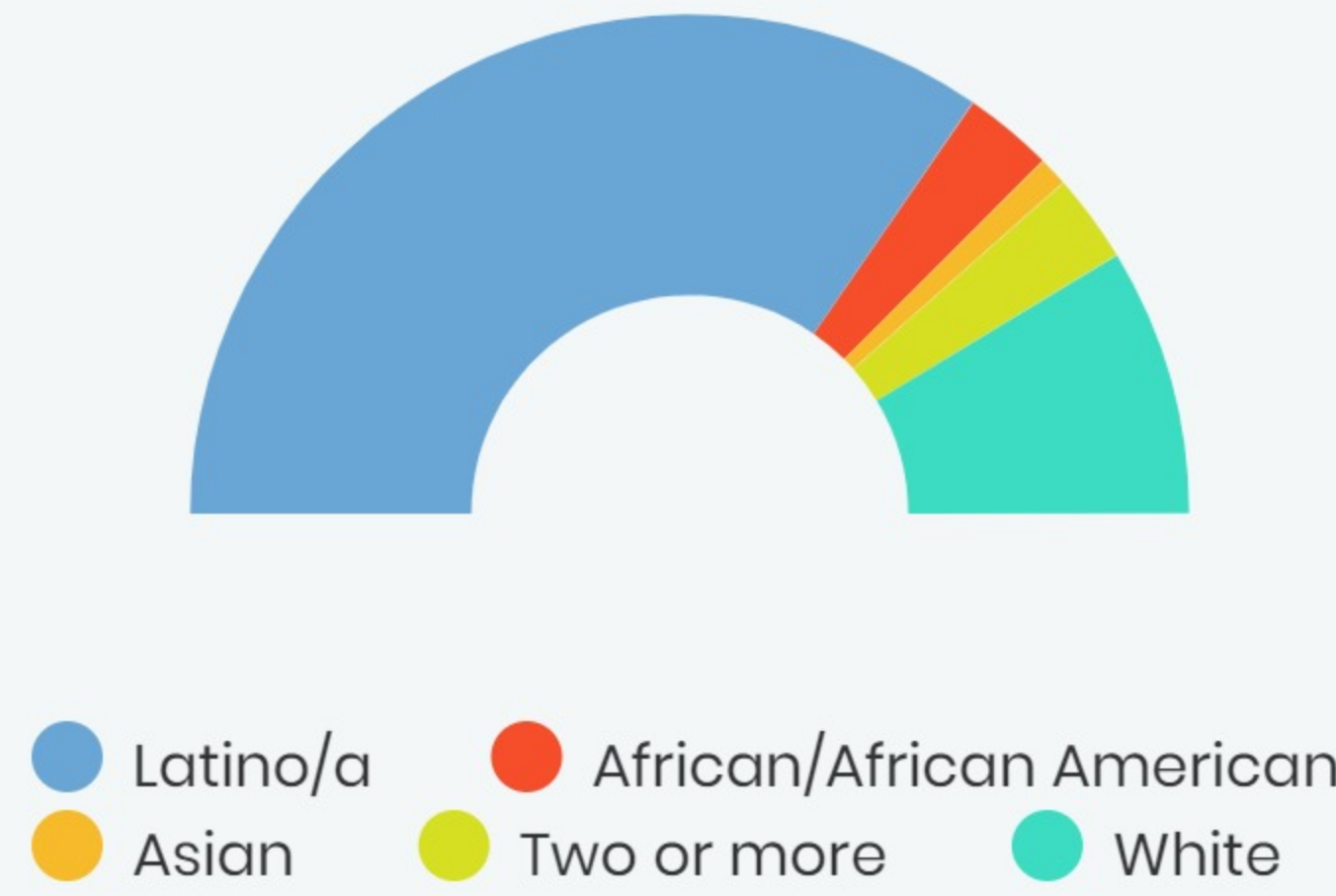
The National Institute for Latino School Leaders (NILSL) is a fellowship designed to bridge the gap between educators and policy makers. Fellows advocate on behalf of Latino students and English learners in their states. They are required to carry-out an advocacy project at their school, meet with legislators and staffers in Washington, D.C., and compose a policy paper. So far, 52 fellows have successfully completed the program since its inception in 2011.

The Fellows

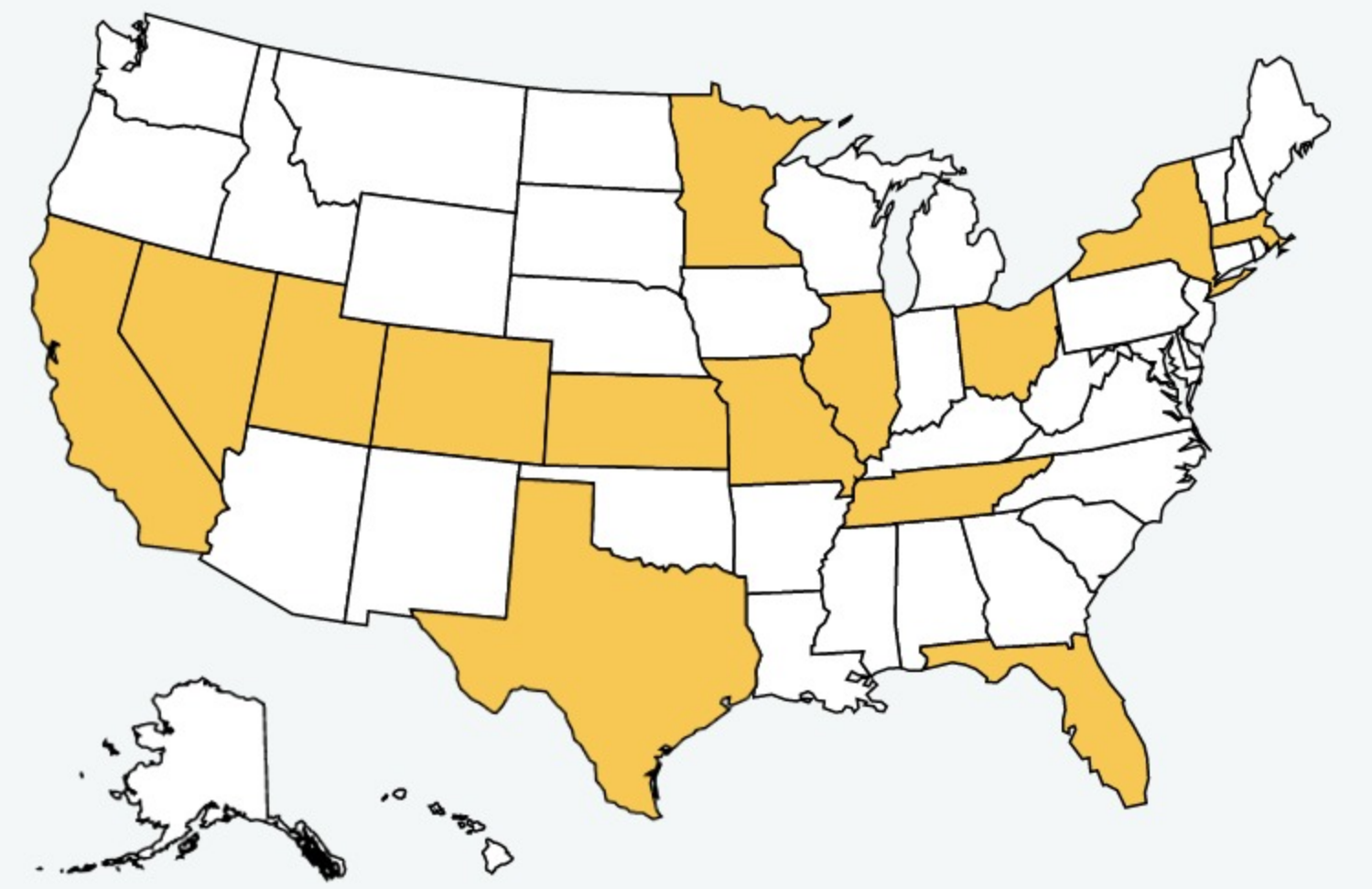
Are mostly female (62%)

The Work

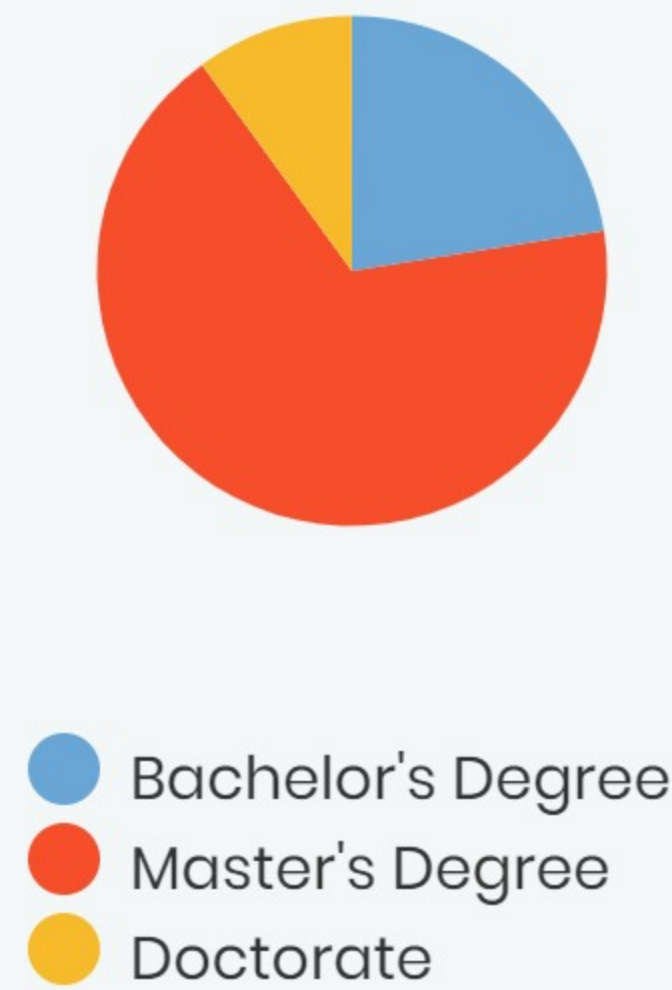

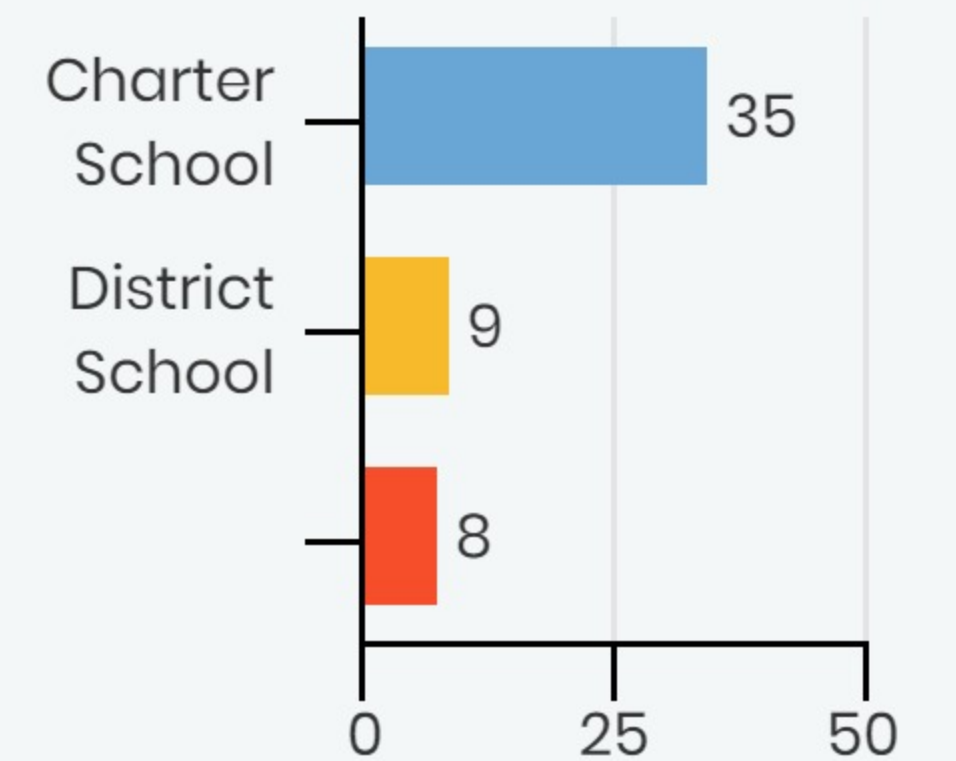

The Impact

2.6 Million*

Around 2.6 million students and adults from school districts and community-based organizations have been impacted by the state advocacy work of NILSL fellows.

97% Sustained Advocacy

Almost all NILSL alumni continue to advocate for their students after the fellowship by attending marches or rallies, hosting community forums and town halls, and meeting with state and local legislators.
